The figures for sexual assault and offensive sexual behaviour apply to women only.

(4) All victims of assaults and threat over the past five years were asked whether they were simply threatened, or whether force was used. Cases where force were used were categorised as assaults. To obtain an estimate of assaults in the last year, the same procedure was used as described above for sexual assaults.
